Taxes are too high, particularly for those who live on fixed incomes.

which is why there were no tax-related survey guestions. However, this November's ballot contains a Virginia constitutional amendment that, if passed, would give Virginia localities (including Arlington) more flexibility in granting real estate tax relief to low-income seniors and those who are disabled.

for the holidays and the school's schedule.



West Entrance to Ballston Metro

In July, the Arlington County Board voted to reallocate money originally dedicated to a west entrance for the Ballston Metro station to fund improvements at the Rosslyn station. BCA member and Civic Federation Alternate Bob Atkins pulled the item from the board's consent agenda so that BCA would have an opportunity to comment on the move at the board's recess meeting. BCA's new NC Representative Larry Smith (and others) spoke on behalf of BCA.

Smith reports that board member Chris Zimmerman spoke in favor of the Ballston west entrance and commented that when the board had approved all the building and development for the western end of Ballston, it was assumed that construction would coincide with construction of the new west Metro station entrance.

Zimmerman moved to have a new financing plan for the Ballston west entrance by 12/31/10. Board member Barbara Favola seconded the motion, and it was approved 5-0. Jay Fisette instructed County Manager Michael Brown to develop a new financial and engineering plan for the Ballston west entrance by 12/31/10 that doesn't depend on developer contributions. Brown replied that it might be difficult to have the plan completed by year-end, but the board insisted on that timetable. Although Zimmerman voted in favor of reallocating the money to Rosslyn, he requested that the funds not be officially transferred until Ballston's west entrance plan is finalized.

We appreciate the efforts of members Atkins, Smith, and Ellen Armbruster as well as the many members who submitted written comments to the County Board for the benefit of the association.

NC Approves Projects in June

Carl Drummond reported that the Neighborhood Conservation Advisory Committee approved 8 of the 12 NC projects presented in the June funding round. BCA is still waiting for the approved sidewalk, curb and gutter project for N. Frederick Street between Wilson Blvd. and I-66 to be constructed (perhaps as early as spring 2011). A sidewalk, curb and gutter project for the 1000 block of N. Edison Street is now BCA's first-priority project in the NC funding queue.

Beaver Pond Retrofit

In 2013, the county plans to rehabilitate (retrofit) the Ballston Beaver Pond so that it functions as the storm-water management vehicle it was originally designed to be. (Note: Beavers no longer actually live in the pond.) The retrofit should prevent the "shortcircuiting" of water flowing through the pond and improve overall downstream water quality. This



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Seeking Volunteers for Edge Development Project

The Planning and Zoning Committee of the Arlington County Civic Federation has launched a Neighborhood Edge Development Project. The purpose of this project is to develop guidelines that will apply to all county properties as they are considered for redevelopment.

The committee is asking civic associations, residential and business property owners, and county staff and developers to participate. The committee has already worked with county staff to gather information on all such properties in Arlington and to segment those by civic association. The next phase calls for individual civic associations to identify "edge" properties in their neighborhood—that is, houses that are next to something other than a house, and therefore may be subject to redevelopment. Once complete, the next phases will be to compile categories and finally to come up with a set of guidelines to be used as redevelopment is considered.

The project is currently in its second phase and interested residents are needed to help identify properties within our neighborhood. The timeline for this portion of project is from now until early spring 2011. Residents closer to Ballston or adjacent to our Wilson Blvd. commercial corridor may be especially interested in this project. What Is the Civic Federation?

In 1916, BCA's parent organization, the Arlington County Civic Federation, was born. The Civic Federation and its member organizations exist to promote "the general welfare of Arlington County."

At the monthly meetings (to which BCA sends its own delegates), Civic Federation members raise and discuss important county issues, work to help achieve better problem-solving outcomes. and strive to insure that citizens stay well informed. In September, the Civic Federation holds a public candidate's night forum; it will host the County Manager and the School Superintendent in December, the state legislative delegation in January, County Board members in February, and School Board members in March. At the April meeting, the Civic Federation will review and discuss Arlington's proposed budget and tax rate for fiscal year 2012.

The Federation's 21 committees include transportation, revenues and expenditures (the county's budget and taxes), housing, emergency preparedness, public services, parks and recreation, schools, planning and zoning, environmental affairs, etc. Visit www.civfed.org to learn more about Arlington's civic life and activities.■

All interested residents are encouraged to attend and meet your current and prospective elected officials. Information on the county bonds to be voted on in the November election will also be available.

Voter Registration/Absentee Voting

Tues., 10/12/10, is the last day to register to vote. If you are already registered and will be away from Arlington on November 2 (Election Day), you can request an absentee ballot from the Office of Voter Registration. To have the ballot mailed to you, the office must receive your absentee voter application no later than 5:00 p.m. on the Tues., 10/26/10. In-person absentee voting will also be available. 

center for the neighborhood. And most people want a safer and easier walk to and from Ballston and the Metro station. BCA's Village Center Committee continues working on these issues.

▶ Add lights along the bike trails and in the parks. Bluemonters made this request at the 2007 Walking Town Meeting. At that time, however, County Board members told residents that Arlington parks close at dusk and no additional lighting would be added along the trails or in local parks.

After serving the membership and this community faithfully for over 8 years (as 1st Vice President and as NC Representative), BCA member Carl Drummond has retired from the BCA Executive Board. At the June Annual Meeting, the membership thanked him and applauded his hard work on their behalf. Among his many achievements, Drummond shepherded several projects through the NC process, including, the 800–900 block of N. Frederick Street, which after 30 years will finally get a complete sidewalk, curb and gutter. We appreciate his generosity with his time, and we thank his wife for her patience.

First Vice President Wendy Dean, who helped spearhead BCA's efforts on the Peck-Staples redevelopment project, also bid the Executive Board adieu. Long-time Civic Federation delegates Kate Mesches and Ed Fendley have returned to "civilian" life after many years of service. Fendley served as association president and as a facilitator for the county's Arterial Transportation Management (ATM) forum. Ultimately, Wilson Boulevard was selected as one of the test ATM projects, which led to improved pedestrian crosswalks, wider sidewalks, medians, landscaping, and midstreet pedestrian refuges being added from N. George Mason Drive west to N. Frederick Street. Mesches worked tirelessly as NC Representative, shepherding several NC projects through the funding process and lobbying to have funded projects (sometimes delayed as long as 10 years) constructed; Mesches remains a member of the county's Parks and Recreation Commission. We appreciate the work of all BCA volunteers, both past and present, for their unselfish contributions of time, energy, expertise, and creativity to help our community.

Bluemont's Natural Wonders

Although Bluemont's parks and open spaces lie in the heart of an urban village, a surprising number of significant natural resources abound. Arlington's new Natural Resources Management Plan includes geographic information system (GIS) maps of each park, marking champion trees, natural geologic features, and significant native plants and animals that must be protected when any trail or park construction is planned. Knowing what we have is the first step in preserving our treasurers.

Our most valuable natural assets:

- ▶ Lacey Woods Park contains the largest Virginia pine on record and the largest recorded eastern hemlock. The majority of the park is a lush oak-hickory forest.
- ▶ Bon Air Park contains volunteer Master Gardeners' educational exhibits including the Quarry/Shade Garden and the Sunny Garden emphasizing wise water use with sustainable, low-maintenance plants. The formal Rose Garden relies heavily on volunteers to maintain its beauty. Recently acquired parkland on N. Lexington Street has many exciting possibilities!
- ▶ Bluemont Park hosts abundant recreational resources as well as significant natural resources including a piedmont mountain swamp forest, oak-hickory forests, and a tulip poplar-spicebush forest among others.

Help Protect These Resources

project will help the county meet its obligation under its storm water permit to reduce pollutants in runoff. Achieving regional water quality goals, however, will require a comprehensive, long-term effort.

Tomatoes on Tuesdays

After becoming concerned about large-scale agriculture's impact, BCA member Dan Redmond started a backyard garden several years ago. He subsequently began borrowing additional garden space through www.sharingbackyards.com. And then through the Project Interaction Coordinator at Barrett Elementary School—where his sons Alec (8) and Aidan (6) attend school—he learned of classmates and their families who were having food security issues.

In 2009–2010, approximately 51% of Barrett students qualified for a free or reduced-price lunch or breakfast. At Ashlawn and McKinley Elementary Schools, nearly 19% and 9%, respectively, of students qualified for free or reduced-price meals. When school is not in session, however, those students

may have to go without, because some North Arlington families face transportation and other challenges that make traveling to the Arlington Food Assistance Center (AFAC) in South Arlington difficult or impossible.

Redmond saw the situation as a perfect opportunity to teach his children about growing things and helping others. They named the effort "Tomatoes on Tuesday"—the phrase they repeated to the recipient families (whose English is often limited) telling them when to expect a produce delivery. Last year, Redmond shared with 13 families. This year, the group was smaller because, as Redmond explained, "I don't have as much garden space in cultivation." Thus far, Redmond's family has completely funded the project. He welcomes other gardeners' participation and will gladly speak to groups interested in garden sharing within their own school community.

Redmond also volunteers for AFAC's Plot Against Hunger (www.plotagainsthunger.org) program and sees urban farming as a potential career transition. As part of his coursework in Harvard's graduate program for environmental management and sustainability, he wrote, Shared Harvest: A Vision for a Sustainable, Organic Urban Farm in Arlington County, VA.
