


PEACE = Partnering to End Abuse in the Community for Everyone

These numbers are HIGHER for those who identify as trans, gender non-conforming and/or non-binary.



According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) almost 1 in 4 women and 1 in 7 men will experience <u>severe physical violence</u> by an intimate partner.





Those most vulnerable among us are at the highest risk

Racial Inequities Black women experience intimate partner violence at higher rates than women overall.

- 41% of Black women experience physical violence by an intimate partner (vs 31.5 % of all women.)
- 60% of Black women report being subjected to coercive sexual contact by age 18 (vs 31.5 % of all women)

Sexual Orientation Inequities

- 44% of lesbians & 61% of bisexual women experience rape, physical violence, or stalking by an intimate partner (vs 35%)
- 26% of gay men & 37% of bisexual men experience rape, physical violence, or stalking by an intimate partner (vs 29%)
- 46% of bisexual women have been raped (vs 17%)
- 40% of gay men and 47% of bisexual men have experienced sexual violence (vs 21%)

Gender Inequities

• Individuals who identify as transgender are at highest risk with more than 50% reporting experiencing intimate partner or sexual violence in their lifetime.

Safety Planning

What is a Safety Plan?

A safety plan is a set of pre-determined actions that can help lower your risk of being hurt by your partner. It includes information specific to you and your life that will increase your safety at school, home and other places that you go on a daily basis. Safety plans can include safety for children and pets as well.

Why is a safety plan important?

Safety plans allows someone who is being harmed in a relationship have the tools they need to act quickly if the relationship becomes increasingly unsafe. It also allows one to prepare what they might need to leave including documentation, money, etc outside of a crisis situation.

Protective Orders

A Protective Order is a legal document signed by the courts and enforced by police to increase safety and add protections. A protective order can require the person doing the harm to do the following:

- have no contact with individual who was harmed (and any children);
- not return to a shared home;
- stay a specified distance away at all times; and
- any other relief needed for the safety and stability of the individual who was harmed.

Partner/SHIFT
Shaping Healthy Interactions for Tomorrow

The Arlington County Partner/SHIFT program (formerly Abuser Intervention Program-AIP) aims to eliminate intimate partner violence in the Arlington community by providing educational and therapeutic individual and group services to challenge and change unsafe relationship behaviors for those who have admittingly used violence and/or coercive and controlling behaviors with a dating, intimate partner or spouse.

Partner/SHIFT is located within the Department of Human Services allowing for easy cross collaboration and support with:

- Child Protective Services
- Behavioral Health (mental health & substance use)
- Housing and Employment Services



Partner/SHIFT Services

SHIFT Groups: Traditional "Batterers" Intervention Course:

- 18-weeks, 2 hr./ group class weekly
- Participants are provided support and education in a group setting with a focus on building skills to have safe and healthy relationships. Additional therapeutic support available upon request.
- Cost for program: \$0-25/per class, sliding scale based on income.

<u>Fathers for Change:</u>

- 16-24 weeks, hourly individual sessions.
- Participants receive one-on-one therapy to address unsafe and unhealthy relationship behaviors with a focus on strengthening parenting skills.
- Cost: \$0-\$180/ per session, sliding scale based on income.

Participants can be terminated from both programs for not making payment towards their fees, for missing more than 2 sessions, for being re-arrested for DV or for noncompliance with program rules.
