	recommendation that the Superintendent presented on May 8 reconcile

	high rated option after E-1.

	APS has had a strategic goal to close the student achievement gap
	between student groups since at least 1999. While reading and math
	Annual Measurable Objectives in 2012-2013 were on target, they remain
	up to 24% lower in reading and 20% lower in 2013 in math for the Gap
	Groups. Advanced Placement course enrollment was 41% and 48% at
	Washington-Lee and Yorktown, but 28% at Wakefield. What is programs
	are in place or being initiated to close the gaps and differences?
